You will see a number of thumbnails. Click on any thumbnail for a larger image. To see all the thumbnails on one scrollable page, click 'all' at the end of the row of page numbers at the top.

If you want to view the images in a slideshow,

there is a slideshow button at the bottom of any large image page. So that the images fit more or less onto your screen, it is probably best to view the slideshow using full screen (Press F11 on your keyboard -- press F11 again to come out of full screen mode)

Right click has been enabled for this gallery and the images are not watermarked, so you are welcome to copy and save images if you wish. Bear in mind though that they are only 700 pixels max dimension. Fine for viewing on your computer, but not much good for printing.

There is no shopping cart with this gallery, but you can order photos from Mark Lambert by post (no email orders, please, as payment is required with order) You can order a CD of all the photos (high resolution jpegs, suitable for printing) for $\pounds 2.00$.

And/or you can order prints: 6" x 4" £1.00 7" x 5" £1.50 8" x 6" £2.00

MIRRORS: It is very unlucky to use real mirrors on stage. An actor, also, should not look into a mirror over the shoulder of another, so that the two reflections are seen together. Doing this will bring certain mis-fortune to the one overlooked. It is also considered unlucky to wear real jewellery on or back stage.

The Origin: Real mirrors on a stage have a tendency to play havoc with a lighting design, reflecting rectangles of light into places never intended to be. Also, actors tend to be vain, and a mirror is simply an unnecessary distraction. Real jewellery, also, reflects the lights in obscure and unwanted ways. Also, jewellery is often lost on or back stage.

PEACOCK FEATHERS: Actors strongly dislike peacock feathers on the stage or in any part of the theatre

The Origin: The most probable reason for this superstition is that the ever-open 'eyes' on the feathers have become associated with the Evil Eye, a portent of horrible misfortune, including death.

What's in a name?

There are many reasons for choosing a stage name instead of using your birth name. Often names are changed because they don't have the right sound or they are thought to be too plain and ordinary. Sometimes people wish to conceal their family origins. Another reason for changing a name,



particularly in the acting profession, is that many acting organisations specifically prevent more then one member having the same name. Mind you, some have achieved stardom without the name change - Renee Zellweger, Leonardo DiCaprio, Hilary Swank and David Duchovny to name but a few.
