How William Terriss Met His Death at the Hands of a Madman at the Stage Door of the Adelphi



On January 14th, 1898, the jury returned a verdict of guilty against Richard Arthur Prince in the murder of William Terriss, but spared him from hanging by finding him irresponsible for his actions by reason of insanity. He was committed to Broadmoor Prison for the Criminally Insane, where he would remain until his death, some thirty-nine years later.

William Terriss was buried at Brompton Cemetary on December 21st, where an immense crowd, estimated by the police to be in excess of 50,000, was gathered to pay their last respects to the much loved entertainer. All the leading theatrical personalities were present; the Bancrofts, Sir Henry Irving, Mr. Seymour Hicks (the deceased son-in-law), Mary Anderson and Lily Langtry to name but a few. Miss Millward, who had been with him at the end, also attended the funeral and had delivered a cushion of white chrysanthemums and lilies with the inscription "My dear comrade" picked out in violets. The funeral procession, which started from Bedford Park, consisted of over 100 carriages. In spite of the funeral taking place in mid-winter, the floral tributes were as numerous as they were splendid, the Prince of Wales himself sent a magnificent wreath of white lilies and orchids accompanied by a card of condolence. The tributes in fact were so numerous that it seemed all London must have been stripped of flowers, and with only a few able to be carried with the coffin two additional hearses were required to carry the remainder to the grave site.

William Terriss left a personal fortune of 20,000 pounds to be divided equally amongst his children, his wife being already independently wealthy.

A Strange Aside to The Story. The day before the murder of William Terriss his understudy, Frederick Lane, had come to the theatre in an agitated state and related to all who would listen the details of a vivid and distressing dream he had had the night before. He recounted that he had dreamed that William Terriss, surrounded by actors and stage hands, was lying unconscious on the stairs leading to the theatre's dressing rooms. His chest was bare and blood was streaming from a gaping wound. An exact portent of what would occur the following night. Three witnesses later signed affidavits that Lane had related his story to them before the murder occurred



WISHING AN ACTOR "GOOD LUCK": It is considered very bad luck to wish an actor (or director, or playwright) "Good Luck" before an performance. Instead, you should say to him or her "Break A Leg".

The Origin: Wishing anyone, particularly an actor, "Good Luck" is apt to fill them with confidence -feeling as though they have "luck" on their side. Confidence in an actor can quickly lead to

FAMOUS NAMES OF THE STAGE

Euripides (ca. 480 BCE 406 BCE) was the last of the three great tragedians of classical Athens (the other two being Aeschylus and Sophocles). Ancient scholars thought that Euripides had



written ninety-five plays, although four of those were probably written by Critias. Eighteen or nineteen of his plays have survived complete.

Euripides is known primarily for having reshaped the formal structure of Athenian tragedy by

catastrophe, as it causes them to lose focus. "Break A Leg" is a very old military term for "taking a knee", or bending down to one knee and breaking the line of the leg.In the theatre it is a reference to "taking a bow". To wish someone to "Break A Leg" is to ask them to give the best performance they are capable so that they may deserve to take a bow at performance end -- or, to "Break A Leg". Another reference to "break a leg" is to slightly bending one's knees. Nervousness and adrenaline can make an actor "lock" their knees, which makes them look stiff on stage and can lead to feelings of illness under the hot lights and even cause them to pass out. Therefore, to "break a leg" can also be applied as a reminder to relax, loosen up, and enjoy giving the performance. Yet another explanation: Because the curtains would billow up when raised and lowered, wooden "legs" were sewn into them. Many curtain calls bringing them up and down would break the wood ... hence Break a leg = many curtain calls.

portraying strong female characters and intelligent slaves and by satirising many heroes of Greek mythology. His plays seem modern by comparison with those of his contemporaries, focusing on the inner lives and motives of his characters in a way previously unknown to Greek audiences.

His play, 'The Trojan Women' aka 'Women of Troy', is on at 7.15 pm in Poltimore House, near Exeter Thurs 24/Sat 26 June. Honour, dignity, and the bitter pain of survival drive this searing and moving drama.
