

INTRODUCING DAVID DUFF

Hello, I'm a new boy! Well, actually I'm well past the 'boy' stage, but I am new to your club. Your committee has given me the privilege of directing King Lear in the spring of next year so I thought it would be a good idea to introduce myself. My name is David Duff and I

have lived in Milborne Port for nearly 6 years. Before that I was based in the Home Counties and I was an actor and director with the Richmond Shakespeare Society, a club with its own 100-seat theatre on the banks of the Thames in which we produce 8 plays a year, two of which are always Shakespeare.

I have directed: King John, Othello, Measure for Measure, Troilus & Cressida and Hamlet. In addition, I have directed the following non-Shakespearean plays: Every Good Boy Deserves Favour, Travesties and Arcadia by Stoppard; Flare Path by Rattigan and Ghosts by Ibsen. For what it's worth. I have been nominated 5 times for either Best Director or Best Play Production in the annual Swan Awards' which covers amateur theatre in the south west London area.

One could describe Shakespeare's range of plays as possessing twin peaks - Hamlet and Lear but I would suggest that Lear is far and away the highest and most difficult to conquer. It will require a cast filled with determination to climb higher than they have ever done before. As a graduate of the 'Ghenghis Khan School of Directing' let me assure you that I am the man to drive you all onwards and upwards!

I will be arranging a workshop on the play which will provide us all with a chance to meet and assess each other. I do not approach this job with any sense of superiority - I saw your Julius Caesar and thought it very well done - but more with a sense of excitement at the chance to work with new actors in

Edited extract from 'As it Was' by Fred B. Alcock, founder of the Players. 'Alf, Captain A T Collings...was the landlord of the Mermaid Hotel...[and] closely concerned in the British legion, Sherborne Benevolent Fund. ..at the Mermaid one evening it came about guite naturally and fittingly that a decision was made to 'do a play' for the Benevolent Fund. Alf at once offered his club-room to us for rehearsals free of charge. We declined such open-handed generosity, but the rent we did pay him was little more than sufficient to cover his outgoings.

Thus it was that the Mermaid became the Players' first home and remained so until after Alf's death ten years later....we had the run of the club-room for all rehearsals, conferences and social gettogethers, and the fact that we now had a base did much towards our establishment as a permanent body."

Shortly before a matinee performance of Peer Gynt at the Old Vic one day. Wilfrid Lawson met Richard Burton in a pub and invited his fellow thespian to see the show. Burton graciously

Lawson, who did not appear in the early scenes, sat with Burton to watch the start of the play. Some twenty minutes later, however, Burton was rather concerned to find his friend still sitting beside him. having made no effort to leave to prepare for his entrance. Finally, Lawson tapped Burton on the arm. "You'll like this bit," he whispered with drunken animation. "This is where I come on!"

THIS MON

Jean-Baptiste Poquelin, also known by his stage name Molière, and considered one of the greatest comedic playwrights in the Western tradition, embarked on a theatrical career this month in 1643.

Among his best-known dramas are Le Misanthrope, (The Misanthrope), L'école des femmes (The School for Wives), Tartuffe ou l'Imposteur, (Tartuffe or the Hypocrite) - see page opposite, L'Avare ou l'École du mensonge (The Miser), Le Malade imaginaire (The Imaginary Sick), and Le Bourgeois Gentilhomme (The Bourgeois Gentleman).

Born Agnes Sybil Thorndike on October 24, 1882 in Gainsborough, Lincs, she was the daughter of a minor canon of Rochester Cathedral. Her career as a concert pianist was cut short by nerve injuries in her hands and she took up acting. Her debut was with the Ben Greet Players and toured the United States with them. She worked with the Old Vic in Shakespearean repertory and played hundreds of classic roles. She was acclaimed for her performances in Euripides' Medea and The Trojan Women and she will be remembered forever if only for the fact George Bernard Shaw wrote his classic "Saint Joan" work specifically for her. In her film career she recreated some of her finest theatrical experiences, including Lady Macbeth and, of course, Joan of Arc. She was made Dame of the British Empire in 1931. In 1969 Sybil lent her name to the new theatre in Leatherhead which became The Thorndike. Despite her 87 years, she performed in the new play There Was An Old Woman in its first season. It was to be her final theatrical performance. She died of a heart attack on June 9, 1976 aged 93. died of a heart attack on June 9, 1976 aged 93.
