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WORK IN PROGRESS

If you have the impression that things have gone quiet at the APS - think again! We do have a longer than usual gap between A *Wife for all Reasons* and *Theft*, because of the much earlierthan-usual scheduling of the former, but we are still on track to mount four productions during the course of 2024.

The reasons for the planning of this "gap" are so that essential maintenance and development work can take place at the Theatre. Already, the side walls of the stage have been replaced, insulated and painted, and the enormous task of insulating the main body of the auditorium has been begun. The forward part of the wall to the right (as you look at the stage) has been insulated and re-boarded, and painted with matching theatrical red paint. It is looking extremely handsome, and already gives an indication of how splendid the whole place will look when finished. Huge thanks are due to Mark Lambert, Adrian Hole, John Crabtree and new APS member Robert Yeo for their tireless hard

insulation is finished, we look forward to warmer winter and cooler summer experiences during our performances! But this is not the only work going on:

- Attention is also being given to the wiring of the stage lights, with work expected to begin shortly.
- A company has been employed to lay a new floor in both the auditorium and the foyer, and again, work is expected to begin shortly. As well as providing an attractive and sympathetic appearance, appropriate for the building, we expect that the covering-over of the many cracks and holes in the existing floor will bring huge dividends in terms of the reduction of heat-loss in the winter.
- Another specialist contractor is standing by to begin work outside, in front of the main doors to the Theatre, to provide a safe and attractive surface (free of weeds!), and also a new ramp for ease of access to the doors. Funding for this is dependent on the outcome of a grant application: we expect to hear news of this within the next few weeks, and if successful,

work will begin very soon afterwards.

• Two further medium-term projects are in the pipeline: we are looking into enhancing the area around the bar, and the bar itself, possibly replacing the existing spiral stairs to the gallery; and as has been frequently reported, we are wishing to replace all of the (comfortable but extremely dilapidated) seating in the auditorium with more suitable modern theatre seating. The cost of new seating will be predominantly met by finds raised through the 100 Club which is why we are so grateful to its members, and so eager for more APS members to join!

As we hope you can see, these are exciting times for APS and for our home, the Sherborne Studio Theatre. We hope you look forward to your next visit and will appreciate the various developments, both in hand, and ongoing.
